

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Donna Crosby - Dec. 2006

In December 2005 a committee was formed to create a vision for the future of the Tree Collection at Riverview. Norma Gillespie, Mary Brown and Donna Crosby from RHCS served on this committee along with Don Gillespie and Elaine Golds from Burke Mountain Naturalists; Doug Justice, UBC Botanical Garden; Michael Nihls, City of Coquitlam; Julian Dunster, Arborist; Ron Simpson, Architect; and Ian Birtwell and Nick Davies from ARES (formerly BCBC).

On January 9/07 Burke Mountain Naturalists will host a meeting which will be open to the public to hear a presentation on "The Riverview Lands Tree Collection Vision". Guest speaker will be Ian Birtwell from the BC Ministry of Labour and Citizen Services (ARES). RHCS members are invited and encouraged to attend this meeting. It will be held at 7:30 PM at Como Lake United Church, 535 Marmont Street in Coquitlam. A review of the natural areas of the site will be undertaken separately in the near future. During the recent extreme weather many trees have been damaged at Riverview. We had a report from arborist Julian Dunster listing over 20 trees either down or damaged. Five were listed as a complete loss. By far the biggest loss is tree #449, a large Scarlet Oak, that lost one of its major limbs. This tree is still being assessed to see if it can be saved. The other losses are mostly smaller cherry, crabapple and one Laburnum. However, it is amazing how many trees sustained little or no damage. We can credit this to the undisturbed extensive root systems that anchored them. Nonetheless any loss or damage to the Riverview trees is a concern and we certainly hope this is the end of the wind storms.

The Future of Riverview

Update, December, 2006

Coquitlam's Riverview Task force committee was reconvened last month to hear a very positive report from councillors Fin Donnelly and Mae Reid on their October 3 meeting with Health Minister George Abbott and local MLA, Diane Thorne. During the meeting, they presented the Minister with a copy of the Task Force Report, "For the Future of Riverview." They feel that the timing is very good for an initiative to develop more housing and care for the mentally ill at Riverview. Also, the possibility of locating Health Region Administrative offices at Riverview was raised.

There has been a great deal of discussion in the media about the problem of housing for the mentally ill, many of whom have ended up homeless and drug-addicted. Premier Gordon Campbell has stated that the initiative to de-institutionalize mental patients has been a failure and new solutions are needed.

In a November 10 Coquitlam NOW article, Reid said Abbott "was pleased to hear that community groups felt Riverview always has been and should always be a place of healing. ... Fin and I left there with a very positive feeling that we had a warm reception, and I just am very hopeful that something positive is going to go forward and we're going to continue on with our work with the task force."



Abbott told a Tri-City News reporter that unlike most municipalities, Coquitlam has indicated it would welcome new residential facilities using the Riverview Hospital property. He also noted it already is the site of one modern mental health facility (Connolly and Cottonwood Lodges). "We would not see the construction of the sort of large warehouse mental health facility that we had in the past at Riverview, but I think by using contemporary standards, using contemporary best practices around the construction of mental health facilities, we could look at Riverview as a potential area for those community health facilities for the Lower Mainland, that is both Fraser and for Vancouver Coastal," Abbott said. "But that's something we are in relatively early discussion on."



RHCS directors are preparing to participate in a possible public education campaign once a plan is suggested. We intend to make public presentations on different aspects of the site such as its history, its tree collection, and our community vision for its future. We need to emphasize that these recent developments underline why the entire site must stay in the public domain, available to serve the needs of the mentally ill. Policies change and what seems a good idea today may be proclaimed a mistake tomorrow. Once the land is in private hands, it is unrecoverable.

Directions: To reach HEY building take Holly Drive through the hospital grounds, then go uphill on Oak Crescent, and the HEY is on your right on Kalmia Drive. Find parking, and meet at the front door. Buses do go through the grounds, ask to be let off above Crease Clinic.

Information: Walks are usually led by a volunteer arborist, and last about two hours, depending on weather and walkers' preference. Dress for the weather, and wear comfy shoes or boots. We go rain or shine. Children to adults welcome. Dogs on 'leash' are also welcome.

Walks are free but you can join the society, or make a tax-deductible donation if you wish.
