Development at Riverview is front page news once again. The on-going problem of the lack of treatment for the growing number of homeless people suffering from both addiction and mental illness was highlighted in a recent Vancouver police report. Politicians and mental health providers are once again looking at Riverview as a place to house and treat the worst affected. In addition, the question of which route the Evergreen Line should take through Coquitlam has been re-opened and the south-west option runs right alongside the Riverview Lands. Both the treatment facility and the rapid transit line are big budget items and the provincial government seems determined to sell a large part of the Riverview Lands to private developers in order to raise money.

In our opinion, this is like selling the family farm to buy a new car. It is not possible to build the high rise housing, services and collector roads shown on the government's plan for Riverview without destroying the unique landscape we have fought so hard to protect. It is not workable to put a treatment facility for severely mentally ill and addicted people in the middle of upscale market housing. It is not realistic to expect that Riverview's tree collection and heritage can be preserved under such a plan. And it is not acceptable for the provincial government to continue to ignore Coquitlam's vision for the future of Riverview.

We are fortunate to have a city council that understands the issue and is willing to respond every time it is raised. Mayor Maxine Wilson and Councillor Mae Reid spoke for all of us when they stated in the media that Coquitlam welcomes enhanced services and housing for the mentally ill at Riverview but is absolutely opposed to putting the land into private hands for market housing. We also appreciate the strong support of local

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HERITAGE DESIGNATION for THE RIVERVIEW LANDS

In the fall of 2007, Coquitlam council directed staff to investigate the possibilities of recognizing the Riverview site as a significant heritage resource that should be placed on the Community Heritage Register.

The City hired Donald Luxton & associates, to prepare a Statement of Significance,(SoS) report stating why it should be preserved, and including an updated chronology of the site. The City held two in-camera meetings, in December and January during which representatives from RHCS and other community groups provided input into the SoS report. On January 21, 2007, the report was presented to council who unanimously voted to place that the entire site, including the land features and buildings on the Community Heritage Register. Council also directed staff to forward copies of the SoS report to the Provincial Heritage branch for possible placement on the B.C. Register of Historic Places, and also

to the Federal government for possible placement on the Canadian Register of Historic Places, with a possible additional designation, as one of Canada's National Historic Sites.

At this writing nothing has been forthcoming from the Province, who will have to agree to the proposed heritage designations, before they would have any effect. If the Province decides to allow heritage status for the site, monies would then become available from the governments involved to potentially restore, or at least stabilize the buildings' continuing deterioration, and hopefully to maintain the landscaped setting, that adds so much to the site.



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DECIDUOUS CONIFERS

Deciduous Conifers were a hot topic on a recent walk with Horticultural Technician students from Douglas College, so I thought I would write about Metasequoia glyptostroboides- Dawn Redwood for this newsletter. We have two specimens at Riverview, the best known is #79 by the intersection of Holly Drive, with the roads from Mariner Way, and Pennington Hall. The other, #433 is hidden behind Quercus robur- English Oak, and Pinus sylvestris, on the north side of the front entrance to West Lawn, and has not had space to develop to its potential.





Metasequoia was only known as fossils, until some were found living in Sechuan province in China in 1941. A seed source from an isolated valley in Hubei was the foundation of the many trees that have been planted since 1948. It is not known how tall they will grow, but some have been measured at 35 m. in parts of N. America, and are still young. Fossils have been found in many areas of the northern hemisphere, including M. occidentalis at Princeton B.C. They are from the Miocene Epoch, which occurred 23-5 million years ago.

M. glyptostoboides is pyramidal in shape, becoming more oval as it matures. The branches are twisted upwards.

The leaves are needle-like, and come in soft, flat sprays with opposite shoots along the stem. They are a brilliant soft green when they emerge in April, turn to a softer green, and become dark amber before they drop in October. The cone is compact, oval in shape, 2.5-3 cm long. The Bark is reddish brown, and fibrous. Buttresses form at a fairly young age.

There are also two varieties known, 'Gold Rush' with soft yellow foliage, and 'Nitschke's Cream' a lighter yellow. I have seen these at the Hillier Arboretum in Hampshire, but they are quite rare.

The other Deciduous Conifers are Larix-Larch, Taxodium distichum-Swamp Cypress, and to my surprise Ginkgo biloba. They all share in looking quite bare during the winter months, then opening very attractive green leaves in the spring, which turn colour and drop in Fall, and bearing

cones, which may stay on the branches through the winter months.

Our first walk is on Sunday March 16th starting as usual at 1 pm, at HEY. Rain or shine, bring the family, dog on leash, friends or come on your own. All are welcome
