Pulse of progress unstoppable, removing "old" quick as a wink!


There is a place not far from here, value rich in the soul ... think!

Self-Sustainability? by Niall Williams

Taken from my comments to the renewingriverview team. (Slightly edited from the original). I posted the comments using my own name, but the folks at Placespeak, decided to change my name to anonymous, along with a few other commentors without our consent.

When did the Province become concerned about self-sustainability of OUR assets? Will this apply to the parliament buildings? Government House? fair is fair.

Riverview was originally founded on the premise to lower patient costs, by attemping to create a more selfsustaining community for the patients; BUT that same premise NEVER applied to labor, building costs even though it did help to lower the costs. We have to go back to the 1970's to see where the costs rose considerably because the patients were not allowed to work anymore, which also lowered many of the patients own sense of personal worth.

Riverview should FOREVER be dedicated to the health care of the peoples of this Province, thousands of patients and staff over many generations worked hard to create Riverview, knowing that is was their SANCTUARY. Only recently has this Promise been broken. and trust violated.

In the normal world, people would look after their homes, and buildings, by doing regular maintenance, they may not want to, but when the roof leaks you fix it, or you may not have a healthy home to live in. At Riverview since the late 1970's, there has been this gradual lack of maintenance, until the 1990's when almost none was done, (leaky roof put a woven tarp on it, which in itself leaks, and makes the problem worse) The lack of maintenance of OUR assets has been glaring at Riverview. You either pay a little all the time, or end up having to pay a HUGE amount to fix it later. Sadly we are at that stage today. In private practice, anybody running a business like that would quickly be out of business.

Through the years many ideas were put forward to lower the costs at Riverview:

Education- Insist on using the site to educate students in the maintenance, construction, landscaping, tree care, painting,,,,,, This idea has been said many times, and would have lowered to costs considerably, and would have given

valuable insight to many students especially those who were interested in building restoration. BUT nothing was ever done.

Health Care- As the increasing needs of the geriatric community (grab a mirror) grow, Riverview will be needed more than ever, (remember we already OWN it).

No idea WHY Fraser Health is now building on expensive land in Port Coquitlam, much the same type of facilities that were provided at Riverview until recently. Want to lower Costs? ask Fraser Health why they

are wasting OUR money to buy private land, when they could have built for FREE on land that we already own. Sadly this whole exercise is all about privatization of health care, to the benefit of insiders, and to the detriment of the patients who are used as pawns in a sick game.

Riverview should first and foremost be used for health care, as has been for 110 years (this May 31). I understand the the Royal Columbian is expanding in Sapperton, at great cost because of the greatly constrained site where it is presently located. Why? are we not insisting on a new hospital being built at

Riverview, since the population around this area is growing in leaps and bounds, and the Province itself recently sold off over 200ha in the area for development.

As a taxpayer I would never expect for Riverview, or health care to be selfsustainable in an economic sense; I would expect it to be looked after properly, maintained well, and only be sustainable in the sense of SUSTAINING a long and healthy life for the people who need health care at some stage in their

The buildings at Riverview, the larger ones being mostly fire-proof materials, are perfect for many government departments to be using, hopefully for services that would not greatly impact any patient health care services on the site. The greatest crime of all of this downsizing, cost-cutting, union-busting, de-institutionalization, whatever you want to call it, was to the the vulnerable older generations of the province, in shutting down Valleyview and North Lawn which provided specialized care to the geriatric population, which is increasing daily. Only to see them dumped into privately-held for profit large institutions, where they are now held hostage, and used as pawns to

generate higher fees from the patients families.

And NO, I never worked there; just a historical researcher, who is still in awe of what was accomplished at Riverview by the past generations, where the patient was the customer, and not a for-profit-pawn as is the case today.
